God's Preferred Future Summer Greetings from Council and Pastor Kjell

How do we figure out and live into God's preferred future for Peace Lutheran Church? How do we discern where God is leading us? **Prayer** and reading **scripture** are at the top of the list. In ACTS 2:42 it talks about how the church "devoted themselves to the apostles teaching and fellowship, breaking bread and the prayers." Peace strives to do this and continues to seek God's preferred future by praying and reading scripture together.

A year and a half ago as we searched for a new Senior Pastor. The Call Committee led times of **listening**—"What is God saying the strengths of our new Senior Pastor should be?" It was clear—"We have been a good congregation, but if we continue to do church the way we have, we will continue a slow decline." So we called a Senior Pastor who is willing and skilled at dreaming with us about God's preferred future for Peace.

In the months after Pastor Kjell arrived, he and Council organized "Cottage Meetings" to listen to stories of Peace's past successes and dreams for our future as a congregation of God's people carrying out God's mission. Over 80% of the worshiping community attended and the findings were similar — "Serving our community and God's people around the globe has brought us life and will continue to do so, but we know we need to rethink what it means to be church in today's world, and we don't know exactly what that change needs to be."

Notes from the June 9 meeting:

At the end of May, our giving fell behind budget and expenses are also below budget.

We will be using the Church Assessment Tool this fall to look at the experiences, perceptions and aspirations of our congregation. Pastor Kjell and Council plan on communicating frequently about the great things that are happening at Peace.

Property Committee: Sanctuary, fellowship hall and gathering spaces are being painted, and research is being done regarding window shades for the sanctuary and lighting in the parking lot.

Evangelism Committee: Working on a publicity policy, a new Peace flyer and getting the word out about the "Welcome Baskets."

Worship & Music Committee: Organ work will begin in June and it might be completed by Rally Sunday (except for the trumpet). A rededication of the organ is planned when the renovation is completed! *Respectfully submitted*, *Joni Sutton, secretary*

Culture's view of church has changed dramatically in the last three decades. It used to be when you moved to a new town, joining a church was the way you built community. Schools did Christmas pageants that told our story. Church membership was important for career success. We no longer live in a world where being Christian gives you privileges or where Christianity is the bias of culture. Even though these are big changes there is still **good news** — since the beginning of the church it has thrived most when not favored by the surrounding culture. We have the opportunity to thrive in a whole new way.

Through the feedback from the congregation and careful study of current research, there are purposeful changes that are already happening at Peace centering around **communications** — website, screen, Twitter, Facebook, guest wifi, sermon and worship style are more interactive and aimed at connecting people's faith and their daily life. There is renewed commitment to reminding people that all their work is ministry, whether at home or job, in the community or the congregation, they are carrying out God's mission — making the world a better place for all and bringing about the Kingdom of God.

There are other congregations on this journey so we will listen and talk with them to learn, and share what is working for us. Researchers are studying vibrant churches and we can use their findings to guide our actions. Also the **Church Assessment Tool** (CAT) will allow us to see the perceptions and aspirations of the people at Peace and in September all members will be asked to participate in that survey.

The Bible is filled with stories of God's people adapting and innovating in times of change; we can learn from our ancestors in the faith and take comfort in knowing...God is with us! God is in our midst as we work to figure out how to be church in this new world and God is out ahead of us leading us into this future.
