Living the Word: Teaching Kids God's Story

Narrative Lectionary, Year 2 (2019-2020)

Lesson #2-33

Acts 17:1-9; 1 Thessalonians 1:1-10

Last Week

Last week Peter and John proved to be the witnesses Jesus said they would become in this week's story as they heal a man lame from birth in the name of Jesus. (Acts 3:1-10).

This Week

We move from Jerusalem and Palestine to follow Paul and Silas as they start the church in Thessalonica. Just as Peter healed in the name of Jesus, Paul will preach in his name (Acts 17:1-9; 1 Thessalonians 1:1-10).

Story Summary

Jesus turned the world upside down and offended people with his teaching. As Paul and Silas enter Thessalonica to proclaim the good news they, too, are met with mixed reactions. Paul and Silas are accused of treason for naming Jesus as king rather than the ruling emperor. When they are bailed out of their troubles in Thessalonica, they simply move on to other places. Paul and Silas fondly remembered their visit and sent a letter back to Thessalonica to encourage the new believers, reminding them that they have been chosen by God and have the gift of Jesus Christ.

Practice: Prayer

Paul practiced a powerful form of relationship building by noticing and encouraging the strengths that were evident in a community. Noticing people's gifts and strengths requires truly paying attention to them. It means not taking them for granted. Thanking God for one another's gifts builds up and supports the community. Write letters to God this week and share them during your family prayer time.

The Point

We are called to be examples of God's love to those around us.

Maps of Paul's Travels

Paul helped spread Christianity throughout the Mediterranean. Paul took three mission trips to share the message of Jesus with the gentiles. The first trip was to Asia Minor, what we call Turkey today. Paul took a second trip to Greece and Asia Minor. His third trip was also to Greece and Asia Minor. Paul helped found churches in many of the major cities he visited. Paul took a final trip to Jerusalem and was imprisoned. He then was transferred to Caesarea, before his voyage to Rome. Tradition has it that Paul was beheaded while in Rome around 62 CE. Many Bibles include maps in the appendices, which provide visual guides of Paul's missionary travels.

Next Week

Next week will bring the story of Paul with another congregation, this one in Corinth. Paul has a much more contentious relationship with this group (Acts 18:1-4; 1 Corinthians 1:10-18).
