Pastor Report | 2020

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in God, so that you may overflow with hope through the power of the Holy Spirit. - Romans 15:13

"You don't know, what you don't know." Many of us would have agreed that this is a true statement a year ago, but after 2020 and the beginning of 2021 there are whole new ways that this rings true. "Global Pandemic" was a term that would have led us to think about a movie or fiction novel. "Racial Justice" might have drawn a picture of Martin Luther King Jr's "I have a Dream" speech. Talk of "unrest in a national capital" wouldn't have even led us to think about Washington D.C. We are living in stressful times.

Grief and loss are often associated with death, the ending of a relationship or job, and natural disasters. In many ways what we are experiencing is ambiguous loss. The child still graduates but most of the traditions that go with graduation are missed. Thanksgiving still happens but we don't get all the smells of mom's house. We are grieving the sense that we know what tomorrow will be like.

All of this loss wears on us. How do you know when you are struggling? I invite you to reflect and answer this question for yourself. In recent conversations I have had with people they have answered: "I get judgmental, saying, 'I'm working harder than others,' I snack, I get tired, I get crabby, I don't engage, I over function and try to control, and I'm resentful." Do any of these resinate with you?

In Jesus' life on earth it seems like he was usually doing one of three things: teaching and talking about scripture, eating with people, or off by himself in prayer and reflection. Jesus' example shows us the need for reflection, to process our emotions and be open to God's movement in our lives and world. Our culture doesn't have a good emotional vocabulary. In our culture it is okay for men to get angry and women to cry, but both of those are secondary emotions. What are the primary emotions below the surface?

The life of faith is an emotional, spiritual and physical journey. 2021 will likely be a year that requires us to tend all three. It will be a year for tending to the many "don't knows" that exist in our lives, congregation, nation and world. It will be a year for clinging to the love of Jesus and being moved by Jesus toward love for our neighbor. Amen

Thanks to our observant members and Pastor we secured a grant to obtain upgraded streaming technology.

Other ways of communicating were instituted such as every member calls. Thanks to all our members and the VISION Team who made calls, for their time and conversational skills. To continue to learn the needs of the congregation during a time of uncertainty we held a listening session in January 2021 to engage members in conversation to assess needs going forward into this next year. Thank you to all who attended and shared.

Although we are operating in a very different way from how we did a year ago, we are moving forward. This past year will undoubtedly be a year that everyone will remember. Although it was difficult to operate on a lot of levels it did present us with opportunities to create new mechanisms of sharing our message, some that will be useful going forward. Minister of Music Report | 2020

Holy Week 2020 was completely 'online,' and only possible due to the help of Scott Rusten, who had figured out how we could stream worship before COVID-19 even existed, and Bob Samuelson, who configured our sound system so that we could use Zoom in our broadcasts. As the year progressed, we added Jason Tofteland, Roger and Angela Birnbaum, and Steve Johnson to the team of people doing the behind-the-scenes digital work of streaming worship. We are all indebted to them for their time and efforts; without these volunteers we would not have been able to worship together weekly, or have our outdoor services in late summer.

I also feel such gratitude to everyone who has been willing to give our new methods a chance, as we worked out kinks and continue to tweak volume levels and other technical issues. Thank you for hanging in there with us through our blips and for faithfully tuning in each week. An even bigger thank you to everyone who has contributed to worship, either by being a lector or lead prayer on Zoom or video, by making a "Sharing of the Peace video," or by lending your voice to our virtual choral projects. Preparing in advance to lend your gifts to our virtual worship services is different than when we prepare to be in the sanctuary together; thank you for making the time and effort to contribute. What a treat it has been to see you all in your homes!

Allow me to take a moment to honor our accompanist, Anne Phillips. She has been a willing and flexible partner throughout our new virtual ministry, and I am SO blessed to work with her. Each week she arrives ready to play on piano or organ, and to roll with the hiccups or unforeseen changes that are unavoidable. Also, when I have a creative idea at the last minute, she is willing to try to bring it to fruition with me!! Thank you, thank you, Anne.

It has been a huge loss that our music ensembles haven't been able to meet, and I miss seeing the members regularly, our music-making, and our collective effort at rehearsals. I am grateful to those of you who have contributed to our virtual projects, including Nancy Peterson and the handbell players. A pandemic cannot stop our musical praises to God!

Similarly, through the 'magic of Zoom' I have been able to continue musical and Biblical leadership with the children of the congregation. We have kept up our weekly meetings and it is truly a highlight to be in relationship with them in this alternative way. I am so grateful to Melissa Weinhandl for doing all the videography work, and for her leadership of the Children, Youth and Family team during this most unique year. It was a joy to put together the "Advent-in-a-Box" projects with her and many helpers, some who have also helped as leaders and teachers in our online programming: Annie Bonow, Deb Weir, Carol Forsberg, Amanda Bickley, Holly Anderson, and Chris Bacon. (Please forgive me if I have inadvertently left someone out!)

I have now been part of the Peace Lutheran community for almost five years, and I have experienced the generosity of Peace members to me and my family personally. I am so thankful, and I feel gratified and uplifted in my work as Minister of Music. Peace has been through some difficulties this year, and there will always be challenges ahead of us. I have faith that this community can withstand the strains and manage our differences of opinion in a Christ-like way.

Children, Youth & Family Report | 2020

When I sit down to write my part of the annual report every year, I go back to my report from the previous year to wonder and reflect on the goals. This year did not go as planned. Our goals moving into 2020 were to continue to assess who we are as a team and to continue to grow toward building a program that will help to encourage life-long faith formation. With the entrance of a pandemic that forced us to move away from in-person programming, we moved from growth to maintenance. As it became clear that this new way of doing ministry was going to be our reality for longer than we had hoped, we began to be more curious about creativity. Something that this team has been incredibly good at is the willingness to try something new. Not only have we been able to move from maintenance to creativity, I believe that this team has been able to provide enriching programming even though we have had to do much of it online.

Our first challenge of the year was Easter and our normally larger Palm Sunday event. We made the "resurrection gardens" remotely and had a very well attended virtual gathering. We believed it to be important to continue with Sunday school for our kids and provided online education on Wednesday evenings. Unfortunately, we had to make the decision to cancel all summer events including day camp and family camp. Camp Wapo did offer a "camp-in-a-box" option. A box was purchased for every family and some of the activities were done together virtually. We were able to hold various events in person and outside through the summer. While we normally would discontinue Sunday school during the summer, we kept up with our Wednesday night programming to continue to give kids some "face time". While we have missed some families, this has been well attended. At the start of the summer, we offered a story time on Saturday mornings. This fall, we started using a curriculum written by a local publishing house called "Spirit and Truth". These lessons are focused on the elements of worship. Our next challenge was Christmas and being able to put together a meaningful Christmas program. Even though we were not able to be together, we had fun with the creativity that video afforded us. We also put together the "Advent-in-a-box" intended for all ages. We distributed 41 "boxes" and it was very well received.

This was a challenging year in many aspects. While none of our programming went as expected, this team was able to move through that, grow in our ability to be creative and be responsive to the needs of the community. This team has definitely been a positive part of the community at Peace and I am filled with an immense sense of gratitude for them. I am also incredibly thankful for the families and individuals who continue to show up and support our work. I am not sure what 2021 will bring. While normally I would have some defined and tangible goals going into a new year, this time I do not. The three overarching goals that will guide us in the near future are flexibility, creativity, and relationship building.

Health Ministry Report | 2020

When Peace hired a Faith Community Nurse (FCN) in 2013, the Health Ministry Committee was designated as the "support team" for the FCN to plan and coordinate Health Ministry events and programs. Sondra Weinzierl resigned from the FCN position in May 2019 and Peace has been unable to find someone to fill the open position since then, having only two people express interest and both withdrawing from consideration upon further inquiries about the specifics of the job. The challenge of finding a FCN is not unique to Peace. When we began our FCN search we were aware that Messiah Methodist church just down the road in Plymouth had been searching for a FCN for over a year. At this point we think it is a realistic conclusion that we will not be able to hire a FCN any time in the near future in part due to the pandemic and lack of available qualified applicants.

In order to address some of the congregational care needs that are currently going unmet, we would like to recommend that Peace formally suspend the search for a FCN and place the Health Ministry Committee on hiatus. Our hope is that this would give Pastor Kjell and the council the opportunity and budget to explore other options for providing pastoral/congregational care without the "health ministry" component.

We pray that there will be a day in the future when Peace can again hire a Faith Community Nurse to provide Health Ministry to our congregation, but under the current circumstances, we know it's time to press pause for now.

The Peace Building Committee has still been active even though the building isn't being actively used by the congregation. In 2020 the committee completed the following maintenance tasks:

- Replaced 4 furnaces in the middle mechanical room
- Cleaned the grease trap located in the Kitchen
- Cleaned the sanitary sewer line from the building out to Medina Road
- · Painted the restrooms next to the Kitchen
- Replaced the batteries in the emergency exit lights
- Replaced the shelf under the dishwasher
- Replaced light bulbs and fixture ballasts when they go bad
- Replacement of furnace filters on their normal replacement schedule (and are switching out filters in inventory from MERV 7 to MERV 13 to filter out smaller particles)
- Repair roof leaks
- · Cleaning of graffiti and spilled paint in the parking lot
- and many other small jobs throughout the year

Members of the committee make weekly walk-thru's to check the building out; the intent is to identify issues before they become real problems.

When the pandemic situation changes and we can gather again, the committee will be making more intensive evaluations of systems, gather crews to do what is necessary and have the building as ready as it can be for us to be together again.

Many thanks to Jack Bacon, Tim Hughes and Mark Stavrum for making walk-thru's and taking on tasks as they arise. David Forsberg will continue to be on the Committee, Mark Stavrum has taken over as the Chair of the Committee.


