Let your light scat - ter the darkness and illu - mine your church.






Hymn of Light

A hymn of praise to Christ the light (#229–231, 560–563) may be sung, during which candles may be lighted. When the large candle is used, other candles are lighted from its flame.

The leader and the assembly give thanks, using the following or another appropriate form.






The assembly is seated.

Psalmody

The psalmody begins with Psalm 141, a song of forgiveness and protection; Psalm 121; or another psalm appropriate for evening.





The psalmody may continue with one or more additional psalms. Each is followed by a time of silence, which may be concluded by a psalm prayer; the assembly responds **Amen.**

Song

Additional assembly song may follow the psalmody. A hymn appropriate to the time of day or the season is normally sung, the assembly standing.

Word

Readings

The assembly is seated.

The service includes one or more scripture readings. After the conclusion of each reading, the assembly may respond **Thanks be to God.**

The reading of scripture is followed by silence for reflection. Other forms of reflection may also follow, such as brief commentary, teaching, or personal witness; non-biblical readings; interpretation through music or other art forms; or guided conversation among those present.

The reflection may conclude with a scriptural dialogue. When it is sung, the following or a similar tone may be used, the assembly echoing the leader.





Giving thanks for all who have gone before us and are at rest, rejoicing in the communion of <u>name/s and</u> all the saints, we commend ourselves, one another, and our whole life to you,



The litany may be followed by one or more additional prayers.

O God, you have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

OR




