SCRIPTURE

John 10: 11-18

'I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father.'

ONE: With the whole church, let us confess our faith in the Triune God. I believe in God, the Father almighty, MANY: creator of heaven and earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day Christ rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. AMEN

+PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

ONE: Let us pray for the church, the world, and all who are in need.

ONE: In John's gospel, you invite us to lean into the care and guidance of Jesus, whom you call our Good Shepherd. In the Psalms, you unspool this image of what it means that you've given a Shepherd to and for us: Our good shepherd "makes us lie down in green pastures." Life would be so much more clear and calm with answers. Yet, here we are with questions. And, here you are alongside us in Jesus, walking through the questions we face. Help us to "live the questions," as the late poet Rainer Maria Rilke offers us for nourishment for our daily lives. Help us to not so much overcome our questions, but metabolize them. Help us to lean into them, wrestle with them, and listen for the wisdom they have for us. Like Jacob at the Jabbok, help us to not let them go until they bless us. Lord, in your mercy, **MANY: hear our prayer.**

ONE: So many who have graduated from high school are preparing for what comes next. Be with them, O gracious God. May they know the care and love of our Good Shepherd Jesus who attends them each and every day. And, O Good Shepherd, be near to parents, grandparents, siblings and friends who cheer what comes next for those whom they love. And still, O God, we know those who cheer may also silently grieve what has been because it will not be the same again. Attend to them too, O Good Shepherd. Wrap them in your arms of love. Lord, in your mercy,

MANY: hear our prayer.

ONE: We pray today, O Good Shepherd, for the mission and ministry of Peace Lutheran Church. Help us to hear your voice calling us to follow when we feel a little lost and confused. Make a way where there seems no way -- and walk alongside us as the ways you have set out for us have been revealed. We thank you for your love and guidance. We thank you for the ways you walk alongside us, no matter what. We pray as well, O God, for those who are ill, hospitalized, or otherwise in need of your care. We offer their names to you in a moment of silence....God, restore your healing and hope to us all. Lord, in your mercy, **MANY: hear our prayer.**
